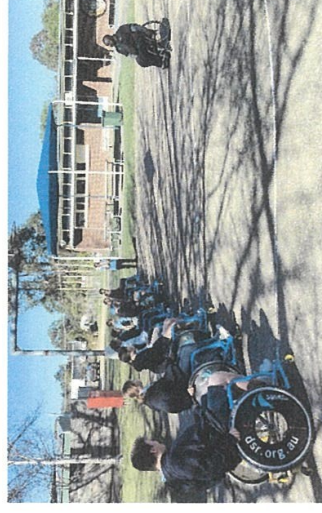
Peter is a really nice person. He is fast on his wheelchair and I loved spending time with Peter.

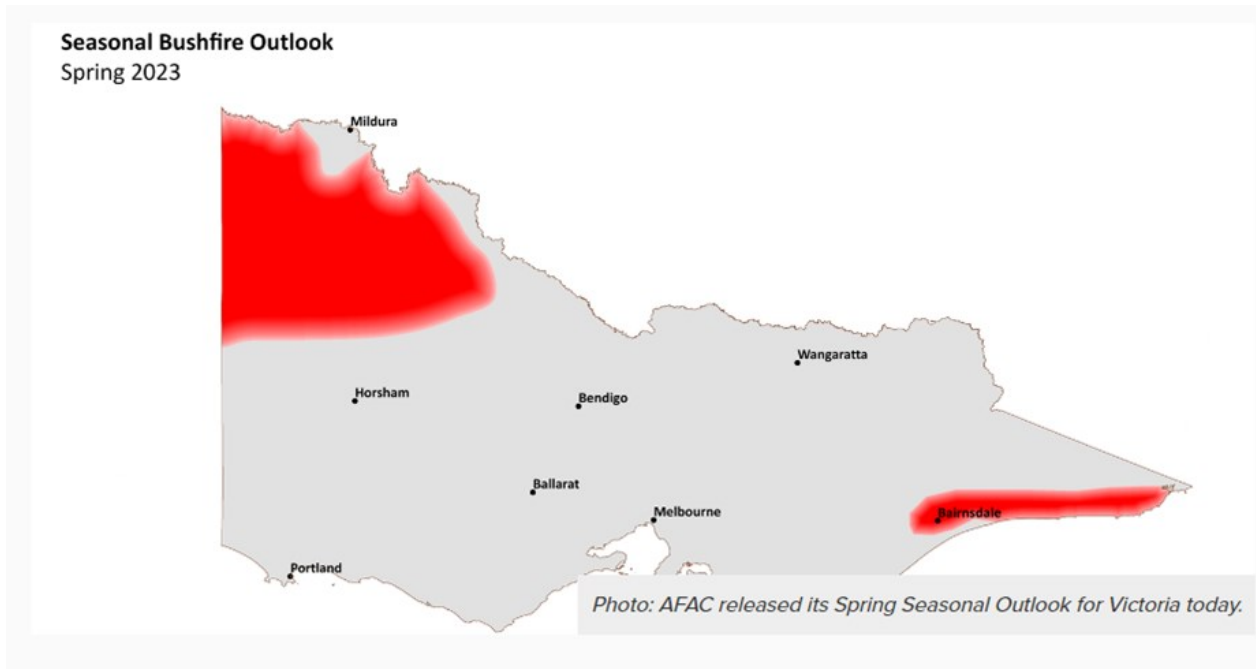

What's going on with the weather? A Seasonal Update

Victorians can expect a drier and warmer spring, with a high chance of an early start to the fire season. Despite below average rainfalls for winter, grass growth is expected to be higher than usual following three years of wet La Nina conditions.

A strong drying trend has emerged recently in far east Gippsland, as a result there is a higher than normal potential for forests to carry fire in the outlook period, including communities close to bushland, especially where vegetation was unburnt during the 2019/2020 fires.

Innovative new technology trial to improve recycled water quality

To help improve the recycled water quality at East Gippsland Water's Bairnsdale Water Recycling Plant, an innovative system is being trialled to provide better environmental outcomes in the recycled water process.

The emerging technology from Canada, BioCord, is a biological nutrient removal process that works in a simple and efficient way using East Gippsland Water's existing final water treatment lagoon at the Bairnsdale Water Recycling Plant.

East Gippsland Water Acting Executive Manager Service Delivery, Judd Boeker, said: "We are very excited to be trialling this new emerging technology to help improve the quality of our recycled water and to see if it can be successfully implemented at full scale.

"Even though our recycled water is compliant with our current licence conditions, these recycled water improvements are designed to ensure that we comply with the introduction of the new Environment Protection Authority (EPA) regulations relating to our General Environmental Duty (GED)."

The BioCord Reactor system is a flexible modular box containing hundreds of metres of cord that enables a biofilm to form. The bacteria then attaches itself to the biofilm, significantly improving the removal of nutrients and organics.

This small-scale trial will provide important data to help inform the many factors needed to consider implementing a full-scale installation of the BioCord system. These include costs, regulatory and environmental approvals, and ongoing maintenance.

If East Gippsland Water proceeds with the installation of the BioCord technology, it will be the first water corporation in Australia to use this fantastic system.



Domestic Firewood Collection Area

Firewood collection seasons: 1 March to 30 June (inclusive)
1 September to 30 November (inclusive)

Firewood Collection Rules

Only collect firewood from within a designated domestic firewood collection area and during a domestic firewood season.

Only collect fallen or felled trees.

Do not collect more than 2m³ per person per day. Note: 1m³ is approximately a 1.8m (6') x 1.2m (4') trailer of split firewood neatly stacked to a height of 0.5m (20").

Do not collect more than 16m³ per household per financial year.

It is illegal to sell firewood collected from domestic collection areas or to use the wood in a commercial enterprise.

Heavy vehicles (> 4.5 tonne GVM) (including any trailer) must not be brought into or used in a domestic firewood collection area.

Heavy machinery (e.g. a bulldozer, crane, excavator, forwarder, hydraulic log splitter, saw bench, skidder, skid steer loader and tractor) must not be brought into or used in a firewood collection area.

Do not tow or winch fallen or felled trees along the ground.

Do not collect firewood within 20m of a watercourse.

Do not drive your vehicle off formed roads or tracks.

Do not cut, break off or damage standing trees or shrubs (living or dead).

Do not take away fallen or felled trees that are visibly hollow or growing moss or fungi with a coverage of >50%.

Do not damage, disturb or destroy native flora and fauna.

Do not injure, damage, deface, desecrate, destroy or remove cultural heritage sites and artefacts.

Take all litter with you when you leave.

Do not enter the forest on days of Code Red Fire Danger rating.

Do not use chainsaws on days of Total Fire Ban.

Use only chainsaws fitted with a proper exhaust and spark arrester.

Only refill chainsaw oil and fuel on an impermeable surface.

Safety **Please take care of yourself and others at all times when collecting firewood. In particular:**

- Avoid collecting firewood when conditions are wet, windy or hot
- Assess your work area for hazards before you start work
- Avoid working near hazards
- Avoid working alone or with children
- Be trained and competent in the use of firewood collection equipment (including chainsaws) and use well maintained equipment
- Wear appropriate safety clothing and equipment

Hazards found in designated firewood collection areas may include, but are not limited to:

- broken overhead branches, dead standing trees
- uneven or slippery ground conditions
- vehicles
- mine shafts
- snakes and stinging insects.



Video surveillance cameras may be installed in this firewood collection area.

Authorised Officers conduct regular patrols of the forest.

Please ensure you abide by collection rules, as significant penalties apply.
