# Killer Whales of Eden By Grade 3-6



Along our coastline there are two types of whales, baleen and killer whales also known as orcas. The killer whale is the apex predator (the animal on top of the food chain).

For 1000 years humans have been using the killer whales to hunt baleen whales (plankton eaters) at Twofold Bay. The killer whales did this by herding them into Twofold Bay where the water was shallow, just like cattle dogs herd stock. The reason that the killer whales did this was because it is easier for them to get the baleen whales. As baleen whales are able to dive deeply, staying under the water for great lengths of time, unlike the killer whales. The killer whales would tire out the whales and then the whalers (people who hunt for whales) would end their lives. Eden is the only place in the world where this has been known to happened. Usually the killer whales only hunt the claves (baby whales).

Once the whalers had caught the whale they would then tie it up near the shore overnight where the killer whales would just eat the tongue and the lips of the whale and leave the rest for the whalers. This was called the Law of the Tongue.

The leader of the killer whales was called Old Tom. When there was a whale/s in the bay, Old Tom would swim to the front of George Davidson's house (the whaling captain). He would flap his tail loudly onto the water making a great deal of noise until he saw George coming out of his house.

In 1930, Old Tom died at Twofold Bay where today you can see his skeleton at the Eden Killer Whale

### Did you know?

The reason why baleen whales travel through the waters of Eden is because they want to find a safer place to have their calves. Antarctica, which is where they live is not a safe place for them. Unfortunately, the killer whales wait for the baleen whales to return.

#### Did you know?

If the whalers fell out of the boat the killer whales would protect them from the sharks and save them from drowning.

### Did you know?

Eden holds the record for catching he longest whale with a hand held harpoon it was 29 metres.

### Did you know?

When the whalers were following the killer whales out to find the baleen whale if the whalers lost track of where the killer whale were they would slap their oars onto the water and the killer whales would hear this and come back to the boat to show them the way.



# **Domestic Firewood** Collection Area

Firewood collection seasons: 1 March to 30 June (inclusive) 1 September to 30 November (inclusive)

# Collection Rules

Only collect firewood from within a designated domestic firewood collection area and during a domestic firewood season.

Only collect fallen or felled trees.

Do not collect more than 2m3 per person per day. Note: 1m3 is approximately a 1.8m (6') x 1.2m (4') trailer of split firewood neatly stacked to a height of 0.5m (20").

Do not collect more than 16m3 per household per financial year.

It is illegal to sell firewood collected from domestic collection areas or to use the wood in a commercial enterprise.

Heavy vehicles (> 4.5 tonne GVM) (including any trailer) must not be brought into or used in a domestic firewood collection area.

Heavy machinery (e.g. a bulldozer, crane, excavator, forwarder, hydraulic log splitter, saw bench, skidder, skid steer loader and tractor) must not be brought into or used in a firewood collection area.

Do not tow or winch fallen or felled trees along the ground.

Do not collect firewood within 20m of a watercourse

Do not drive your vehicle off formed roads or tracks.

Do not cut, break off or damage standing trees or shrubs (living or dead).

Do not take away fallen or felled trees that are visibly hollow or growing moss or fungi with a coverage of >50%

Do not damage, disturb or destroy native flora and fauna.

Do not injure, damage, deface, desecrate, destroy or remove cultural heritage sites and artefacts.

Take all litter with you when you leave.

Do not enter the forest on days of Code Red Fire Danger rating.

Do not use chainsaws on days of Total Fire Ban.

Use only chainsaws fitted with a proper exhaust and spark arrester.

Only refill chainsaw oil and fuel on an impermeable surface

Please <u>take care of yourself and others at all times</u> when collecting firewood. In particular:

- · Avoid collecting firewood when conditions are wet, windy or hot
- · Assess your work area for hazards before you start work
- Avoid working near hazards
- Avoid working alone or with children
- · Be trained and competent in the use of firewood collection equipment (including chainsaws) and use well maintained equipment
- · Wear appropriate safety clothing and equipment

Hazards found in designated firewood collection areas may include, but are not limited to:

- broken overhead branches, dead standing trees
- · uneven or slippery ground conditions
- vehicles
- mine shafts
- snakes and stinging insects.



Video surveillance cameras may be installed in this firewood collection area. Authorised Officers conduct regular patrols of the forest. Please ensure you abide by collection rules, as significant penalties apply.
