
## **Lindenow South Primary School Student Wellbeing & Learner Diversity**

#### Parent Learning Series: Supporting Our Children

#### **How to Embrace Neurodiversity in the Community**

Here are some ways to embrace neurodiversity in your community:

- **Be mindful of the language you use.** It's OK to ask if you're unsure. For example, "Do you prefer 'autistic child' or 'child with autism'?"
- **Challenge unhelpful attitudes.** For instance, you could speak up if someone criticises a parent whose child is having a "meltdown" in public.
- **Avoid assumptions.** A child wearing headphones in a supermarket or eating only packaged snacks at a picnic may have good reasons for doing so.
- Look for ways to make your community more inclusive. For example, support a local supermarket in introducing a "quiet hour" each week with dimmed lights and no music.
- Talk respectfully about neurodiversity. Many people you know may be neurodivergent, even if they haven't shared it.

# Lindenow South Primary School is in Category 4 on the Bushfire At-Risk Register List

#### School preparations for the bushfire season

Each year, we undertake a range of activities to ensure the safety of our school and to prepare for bushfires and grassfires.

An important part of this process is communicating to parents what will happen when certain fire danger ratings are issued to help ensure the safety of students and staff.



Our school has been identified as being at risk of bushfire or grassfire and is a Category 4 school.

Our school will close on a day forecasted as Catastrophic fire danger rating in Gippsland, West and South Gippsland, Central, North Central, fire weather district fire district.

Closure of the school due to a Catastrophic fire danger rating will be enacted when the Bureau of Meteorology forecast and related public safety messaging are confirmed. Due to uncertainties in the forecast, the timing of this confirmation may vary. Information regarding potential or confirmed Catastrophic fire danger days will be communicated to you by

It is also important to be aware that:

- No one will be on site on days where the school is closed due to a forecast Catastrophic day.
- All bus routes that travel through the Catastrophic area will be cancelled.
- School camps will be cancelled if a Catastrophic fire danger rating day is forecast for fire weather district in which the camp is located, or if the travel involves passing through areas that have Catastrophic fire danger.

As part of preparing our school for the fire season, we have updated and completed our Emergency Management Plan.

#### What can families and the school community do to help us prepare?

- Ensure we have your current contact details, including your mobile phone numbers.
- Keep in touch with the school community and school via community Facebook page and contact the school via school's email. <u>Lindenow.south.ps@education.vic.gov.au</u>
- Make sure your family's bushfire survival plan is up-to-date and includes alternative care arrangements if our school is closed due to Catastrophic fire danger. Further information can be found on the <u>CFA's website</u>.
- Action your family's bushfire survival plan if your own triggers are met. Our school community
  may be spread out across many areas and some families may be at higher risk than others. Your
  family's safety is critical, so please let us know if you are actioning your bushfire survival plan and
  if your children will be absent on these days.
- If your child is old enough, talk to them about bushfires and your family's bushfire survival plan.

Families are encouraged to action their <u>Bushfire Survival Plan</u> on Catastrophic fire danger rating days in their district. The safest option is to leave the night before or early on the morning of the Catastrophic day. **On such days, children should never be left at home alone or in the care of older children.**

#### **Frequently Asked Questions**

#### What is the department's policy?

The Department of Education annually assesses the fire risk of all schools and early childhood services with the support of the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation (CSIRO). They are allocated a category of risk (categories 0 to 6). Schools and services that are Categories 0-3 are published on the <u>Bushfire At-Risk Register (BARR)</u>. Schools at some risk of bushfire and grassfire are published on the <u>Category 4 List</u>.

The department's <u>Bushfire and Grassfire Preparedness Policy</u> requires all schools and early childhood services on the BARR and the Category 4 List to close when a Catastrophic fire danger rating day is forecast in their fire weather district. All school bus routes which travel in or through a district with Catastrophic fire danger must also be cancelled.

The policy also requires that schools at the highest risk of bushfire (those in Categories 0, 1 and 2 of the Bushfire At-Risk Register) enact pre-emptive action plans based on the fire danger forecast for their Local Government Area (LGA).

#### Who issues fire danger forecasts?

The Bureau of Meteorology (BoM) provides public fire danger rating forecasts each day of the fire danger period using fire weather district areas. In Victoria, there are 9 fire weather districts, which are based on Local Government Area boundaries.

The department uses these forecasts when supporting schools to enact their pre-emptive bushfire actions plans.
