Our trip to Bairnsdale was capped off with lunch and play in the sunshine at the All-Abilities Playground. What an exciting day we had! Reading:

Writing:

In writing this week, students will finish drafting their Writer's Festival pieces and will learn how to edit and revise their work.

Hello and welcome to week 6 of Term 3, we are now already halfway through the term! Students engaged extremely well in our excursion to the Museum yesterday. They showed constant enthusiasm and asked questions to help them deepen their understanding of what life was like in the past.

This week in reading we are taking the time to enjoy, read and talk about the shortlisted books in light of book week, where the theme is 'Reading is Magic'. We will be practising a variety of skills by doing this. We will also be engaging in whole school rotations around these books on Friday.

In writing we are continuing to work on and edit our writing pieces on the concept of 'Lost' for the writer's festival. Students are very proud of their writing pieces and the progress they have made. In handwriting this week, we are working on the letter Vv.

In Maths, we are beginning to look at the concept of sharing and grouping as the foundation of early multiplication and division skills.

Finally, we are still collecting tin cans and various lids to be used for a project later in the term. It would be awesome if parents and students could collect these and bring them into the classroom to make this possible.

Week 6 – that means we are over halfway through the term and it is Book Week! There is excitement in the air, as children talk about who they might come as Friday and explore the books available at the book fair. Please remember, dressing up does not have to mean purchasing costumes. The junior school council is also running a 'book swap', so everyone has an opportunity to go home with a 'new/recycled' book as part of book week. The students of the week this week are:

3/4A – **Charlotte Butcher** for adding great detailed descriptions to her 'Lost" story, making clear images for her audience.

Chloe Jackson and **Luna Sutherland** for their great explanation and modelling of the window methods for multiplication. I think we have a couple of teachers in the making!

3 / 4 B – **Bella Pool** for the way she has been taking on feedback about her writing as she edits her 'Lost' story. **Mason Livingston** and **John Humphrey** for the supportive and collaborative way they have both been working with other students during maths. Two potential leaders here!

We will be working on finishing our drafts for our writers' festival stories and editing them ready to publish. We continue to focus on character development and adding detail during our mini lessons.

In reading, our mini-lessons will focus on finding evidence to support our ideas about characters. Children then have the opportunity to practise these strategies as part of their reading group and during independent reading time

In maths, we are shifting our focus to division, its relationship with multiplication and how we can use arrays to assist us in solving division problems. As part of our fluency, we are building both our individual and whole class ability to skip count by a range of different numbers.

Students have begun the design phase of our Scorching Swings and Slides. An important aspect of this is deciding what materials should be used in the construction. This will be identified on their plan and then we are hoping that children can build a model of their playground with recycled materials.

Don't forget, all students are expected to read at least three nights a week and this is their homework. We also encourage children to practise their times tables to support their work at school. Have a great week.


