Hello everyone,

Welcome to this new week in the Prep/1 classroom. Our class awards go to **Austin Reggardo** for his leadership in small group work and his bounce back when injured, and **Oliver Guarnaccia** for his enthusiasm for writing a story using visual prompts.

This week:

**Reading:**

This week, we are getting our knowledge ready (GKR) as we launch into our mentor text, '*Big Rain Coming*'. Students will make predictions about the story based on the title, front and back covers, and the beginning of the narrative.

**Writing:**

In writing this week, we will be learning about narrative structure by studying fables. Students will learn about characters and the setting, and that a story has a beginning, middle, and end. Preps will focus on the sounds j and f, whilst the grade 1s will learn about adding -ed endings to base words.

**Maths:**

Students will continue to learn about the value of different coins and their features and will build their understanding that 100 cents equals \$1.

As part of our sustainability unit this term, we are requesting families collect recyclable materials including tin cans, plastic and metal bottle caps, and jar lids for our upcycling project. Thanks in advance for your contributions!

## FRENCH

Bonjour,

Our student of the week is **Eli Spiker** in grade 2 for his enthusiasm and hard work during our lesson on Bastille Day. He was particularly impressive during our match up quiz on the vocabulary learnt during that lesson.

This week, students in grades Prep to 2 will go back to learning numbers at their own level, setting themselves a learning goal for the term. We will also start on our topic of food, focusing particularly on fruits, which was requested by the majority of students in term 1. We'll practise talking about healthy ("bon pour la santé") or unhealthy ("mauvais pour la santé") food with some sorting activities.

Grade 3 and 4 students will also set their new goal on numbers and they will be introduced to a new weekly activity on verbs. The idea is to get them to practise the present tense of verbs ending in -ER in French (about 90% of the verbs), so they can make full sentences on a range of topics. Our focus will be on subject pronouns. By the end of the year, students in term 3 will be expected to learn how to make changes to the verbs with pronouns I, you, he and she, while students in term 4 will have to practise with all pronouns, including we and they.
