The popular **FIXIT CAFÉ** continues to provide a valuable repair service for the local community. Members of the Men's Shed apply their skills each month and successfully fix most items that are presented. Electrical goods and clocks are readily accepted and a sharpening service for garden tools and kitchen knives is also available. From November there will also be a gentleman with knowledge of repairing mowers, if you have an old mower in your shed that requires attention it is possible that the Fixit Café could bring it back to life! Bookings are essential to avoid disappointment, please phone Mitchell House or drop in personally to register your repair request. The next Fixit Café will be held on 19th November.

The service is free but a donation to cover costs is welcomed.

The Community Survey conducted earlier in the year provided much important feedback for the Neighbourhood Centre to consider. There were 63 respondents and the majority of these were current WNC members. The thoughts and ideas submitted therefore, represent a useful window into the thinking of our membership on the operation of the Centre.

The vast majority of respondents noted that Mitchell House is a very welcoming and helpful place that is much valued by the local community. The overwhelmingly positive response served to affirm and encourage the Committee of Management, staff and volunteers of the Centre who collectively seek to ensure that WNC operates with integrity and provides a range of services that are appreciated by members of the community.



A number of ideas for future activities were suggested through the survey including Cooking classes, a range of craft activity, dancing and exercise classes and occasional guest speakers to name a few. These ideas are gratefully received and will be considered by the Committee and Manager going forward.

There were also suggestions regarding potential improvements at Mitchell House. These included better use of the outdoor area, increased toilet facilities and a remodeling of the reception area. Each of these needs have coincidentally been on the Committee's agenda for a while and actions to improve the Mitchell House facilities is already in process. The Committee of Management is grateful to all those who took opportunity to share their thoughts by responding to the survey.

The Multicultural Women's Group

Activities have varied from information sessions on Australian citizenship, the NDIS, voting and the Referendum on The Voice, to a Thai Chi demonstration, a mosaic workshop at Bunnings, a visit to Gippsland Mushrooms, craft and games sessions, cooking, attending the International Women's Day Lunch at Phillip Island, gardening, visits to member's homes, a combined event with the Moe and Warragul Multicultural Friendship Groups and another market stall to help finance our excursions which include an overnight trip to the Yarra Ranges in September.

We also have days when we just meet over morning tea to talk and enjoy the company of others. The members of the group are very supportive of each other.

Our new meeting time is 11am-1pm on Thursdays, which seems to suit everybody better.

Housing Matters Bass Coast

The Homelessness Awareness Week event was successfully conducted by the group at Mitchell House on August 12th. This awareness raising event



invited members of the local community needing assistance to mingle in an atmosphere of music, food and information sharing. Local businesses contributed vouchers for the needy and the issues of homelessness and the lack of affordable housing on the Bass Coast were discussed. Attendees were asked to sign an 'Open Letter' outlining the various issues associated with the lack of affordable housing. The letter was formerly passed to local state member of parliament, Jordan Crugnale on September 5th.

Cr. Michael Whelan (Lord Mayor) addressed the gatghering as did Jessica Harrison from HMBC. Our Local ALP member Jordan Crugnale attended, and other members of Homelessness Services.

Our band of volunteers kept the day running smoothly and the all day musical entertainment provided a great atmosphere. At the end of the day 5 lucky individuals won a \$100 Coles vouchers provided by the Rotary organisation.

HMBC members are currently supporting four women who are homeless who made themselves known to HMBC members during the event.
