L2P PROVIDING IMPORTANT SERVICE

The local L2P program fulfils a valued role within our community. Funded by the Transport Accident Commission and administered by the Department of Transport, the program has been developed to assist eligible young Victorian learner drivers between the ages of 16 and 23 years. Young people who do not have ready access to a supervising driver or an appropriate vehicle are matched with a volunteer mentor who will work with them over a period of time as they gain skills and experience and complete the required number of practice hours before being eligible to take their probationary licence test through Vicroads.



The program is managed locally by Melanie Mumford pictured here with Zoe Keltie (on the left with Charlie) and Leone Thiele. Melanie has access to modern vehicles and has recruited a number of mentors over the years who have successfully supported many young people on the path towards gaining their driving licence. If you know of a young person who could benefit from this service or if you would like to consider volunteering as a mentor, Melanie would be keen to hear from you. Volunteer mentors are required to undergo a police check and complete a training session before taking up the role, Melanie is very willing to assist prospective mentors complete both these tasks. Mentors will attest that the rewards for working with a young person towards achieving their goal are significant! Annual General Meeting

The Wonthaggi Neighbourhood Centre and Harvest Centre AGM was conducted at Mitchell House on November 7th. Seventeen members attended including members of the current Executive and Committee of Management with the exception of President Sylvia Davey who sadly was unable to be present due to a recent family bereavement.

The meeting was chaired by Vice President, Jill McAdam.

Jill provided a warm welcome to all present and warmly introduced the recently appointed Centre Manager, Leslie Adams and Administration Officer, Nikki Kelly. The appointments of Leslie and Nikki were acknowledged with applause and a sense of genuine gratitude. Jill acknowledged the challenging period of transition endured since the sad and unexpected passing of Iain Ritchie earlier in the year and thanked the Committee members and volunteers for their work to ensure that the Centre continued to serve the community while the search for new staff proceeded. Leslie and Nikki are settling into their respective roles and looking forward to continuing and building upon the reputation of the Centre within the Wonthaggi community.

Jill presented the President's report prepared by Sylvia that highlighted the extensive and varied work of the Centre during the year in support of community members. Also noted were the significant challenges experienced during the year in response to the presence of COVID and the restrictions that this imposed on the normal activity of the Centre. Outgoing Treasurer, Michael Nugent presented the financial statements reporting on a small deficit for the year that would have been significantly more were it not for the significant COVID related funding provided by the State Government during the year. The Centre has a very healthy ongoing balance that has allowed the Committee of Management to increase paid staff time and improve the physical amenities of Mitchell House while still ensuring that reserves remain at an appropriate level. Michael's hugely significant contribution as the WNC and Harvest Centre Treasurer over a number of years was gratefully acknowledged by Jill and the meeting generally.

UKULELE GROUP HITS THE RIGHT NOTE!

The Ukulele is an instrument that has its origins in Portugal before becoming popularised in Hawaii. The name ukulele roughly translates as "jumping flea" perhaps in reference to the player's fingers across the strings. It became popular during the 1800s in Hawaii largely in response to the enthusiastic support for the instrument displayed by an Hawaiian king, Kalakaua. Since those times the instrument has become symbolic of Hawaiian music and culture.



Since the 1990s the ukulele has experienced a surge in popularity globally and this surge is also apparent locally. A group of local enthusiasts gather each week at the Neighbourhood Centre to hone their craft and enjoy a fun time together. The group enjoy playing and singing along to a broad variety of tunes. The laughter and fellowship enjoyed by the group is an added bonus as they share their mutual love for the instrument and music generally. The group occasionally perform for the residents of local nursing homes and will be bringing some very welcome Christmas themed cheer to residents in the weeks ahead.
